Our goal is to make the patient experience less restrictive by providing an invisible method of continuously monitoring a patient's vital signs and fall risk, without adding any painful attachment to their skin. Patients can feel safe without having to be “hooked up” to countless monitors – a sense of wellbeing that goes a long way toward increasing hope. Improving patient safety – improving patient outcomes – improving nurse satisfaction. Here's how we help:

- Cancer patients have enough pain to deal with – the LifeBed tracks them continuously without attaching leads to their skin
- Patients admitted to the unit may be immunosuppressed and require diligent infection control processes.
  - The LifeBed supports infection control programs by providing fully cleanable surfaces appropriate for isolation and regular hospital rooms, to decrease the risk of cross-infection and cross-contamination
- Treatment-related weakness can lead to an increased fall risk
  - LifeBed features three levels of response for potential falls, tailored to patient condition and need
- And for patients at the end of life, the LifeBed ensures that they won't be alone in those final moments, by bringing the patient's nurse – and family – to the bedside at this critical time.
